This Psalm came to mind as I was thinking of ways to relay all of the changes that have been going on in our Early Childhood Ministry here at St. Paul's. We have been on the receiving end of countless blessings over the last several months, more so than on any average day. It's as though God has opened his hand of grace and has said, "Here! Here are all of these blessings; I hope you brought a big enough bushel basket." Well the truth is, we didn't bring a big enough bushel basket, and there's no way that we could. Our blessings overflow. ...and forget not all his benefits. First and foremost, our greatest benefit is laid out a little further in Psalm 103:3-5a "who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit and crowns you with love and compassion, who satisfies your desires with good things." Our Early Childhood Ministry at St. Paul's has certainly been on the receiving end of those "good things." Here are a few of the benefits Little Lambs and our school's Preschool have received.

- Our Preschool enrollment for the 2017-18 school year has already been closed because the class is FULL. Full. In two weeks. We already have a waiting list started. This is amazing!
- We're worried about Kindergarten being "too big" next year. Our 4K retention is holding strong. If all of our projections are correct, we're looking at having to cap the Kindergarten class at 15 children!
- We've seen a big increase in inquiries in Little Lambs and our toddler-aged enrollment has greatly increased.
 We also have four more babies scheduled to start between the end of March through October with a growing waiting list.
- In order to better accommodate the current children in our care with a more developmentally appropriate setting and to allow us space to steadily grow, we've been given approval to add an extra room for 1-2 year olds! For those who may be wondering, this is to better accommodate the current children in our enrollment with the current staff. We just have an empty room and willing staff to make this happen. Our new age-level break down will have children ages 6 weeks through 1 year in our "Discoverers" Room, children ages 1-2 years old will be in our "Explorers" Room, and 2-3 year olds in our "Inventors" Room. These changes will take place April 3rd.
- We have an amazingly wonderful staff. Have you noticed how our classrooms look lately? You should check them out. They're a direct reflection of how dedicated our staff is and the effort they put in everyday to ensure that the children in our care are taken care of with love in the best environment possible.

Those are just a few of the blessings we've received, but as Psalm 103 reminds us, "and forget not all his benefits." Ministries take work and dedicated people to work them and make them successful. We do not want to forget that God has opened his hand of grace and is showering us with blessings. We are always in need of help and looking for ways to build the bridge between our childcare center and our church. Please consider volunteering or working in our childcare center; even if you can only do a few hours one day a week. Sharing the Gospel with these little lambs and their families is one of the greatest benefits of our Early Childhood Ministry! I look forward to trying to catch all of these blessings with you!

Am I a leader? Many people will ask that question and quickly respond, "I am not cut out to be a leader." I am writing to tell you to stop and think about this question before quickly responding that you are not right for the job. Think about the qualities of a good leader and if you may be the right fit for a leadership position.

First of all, leadership is often confused with action. True leaders see what needs to be done and know that it is important to complete various tasks. Doing the work is not the job of a leader. Leaders are responsible for making sure that shared goals are achieved. A leader will burn out if they try to do all the work themselves. A leader does not, and in many cases should not, do the work on the committees. He should oversee the work that is being done and make sure that it fits into the mission of the church. His goal is to equip and motivate committees and ministry groups for acts of service.

Leadership is not dictatorship. Leaders are called to be servants of the church. We are not called to dictate how the work needs to be accomplished. However, we are called to oversee and ensure that the work is done with excellence and not in a haphazard way.

How can you know if you are called to be a leader?

Here are some hints:

- 1) You want to make a difference and you want to do this intentionally with an end goal in mind.
- 2) You acknowledge what is the current status quo, but you also envision what could be and how to get there.
- 3) You encourage others and foster unity.
- 4) You value relationships more than tasks and can see the big picture.
- 5) You are quick to say, "I messed up. Now what can I do to fix the problem?"
- 6) You are a learner. True leadership requires the willingness to continue to learn.
- 7) You refuse to blame others for your actions and instead work to find solutions.
- 8) You realize that you don't have to be in charge to have an influence on the mission and vision of the congregation.

Now with those questions in mind, how can women help?

Leadership is not a dictatorship. Men are not called to lord it over women. Women can certainly be leaders in the church. However, it is important to remember the biblical principle of headship. 1 Corinthians 11:3 says, "Now I want you to realize that the head of every man is Christ, and the head of the woman is man, and the head of Christ is God." Scripture clearly lays out the structure of leadership – God, Christ, man, and woman. However, keep the principles of leadership in mind that I spoke about above. While council positions require male headship, women are welcomed and encouraged to lead and serve on committees and ministry groups in the congregation. Scripture shows many places where women served in positions in the church. 1 Corinthians 12 explains that we, the Church, are made up of many parts. We all have gifts to serve in different ways. This includes the women of our congregation.

Please consider how you can serve in this congregation.

There are many open positions in the church both as leaders on the church council as well as committees and ministry groups. We are specifically seeking these chairmen positions on the church council: Board of Outreach, Board of Family Ministry, and Board of Worship. If we do not have leadership on the council, then ministries will suffer.

For example, how can we have VBS without a Board of Outreach chairman? The answer is simple. These ministries will not happen without leadership. As I stated previously, ministry must be done with excellence. The Board of Outreach chairman does not have to do the work of organizing VBS directly, but he does need to oversee the ministry and report the details and the council meeting. The council meeting minutes are then shared with the entire congregation. That is how ministry happens in our congregation.

In addition to those council positions, there are many other ways that you can serve. Speak with one of the pastors or members of the council to see how you can use your gifts to serve the congregation. Finally, pray for your leaders – both those that are called workers and those that serve as lay leaders in our congregation. Pray that God would grant them wisdom and guidance.
