# God Makes His Church Grow, No Matter Who Cares for the Seed

Around this time of year, you always see more sprinklers and watering systems, especially with the weather we've been having. We have to provide water to crops and plants because, without it, they'll die. Water can bring life, but sometimes we need people to get water where it needs to be. Farmers keep a close eye on their irrigation systems and gardeners watch their flowers closely so that they can get exactly the right amount of water to their respective fields.



The Apostle Paul talked about a process similar to gardening. But, his field was a little different than rows of corn or a bed of petunias. The seed he brought with him was found in the gospel message of full and free forgiveness found at the cross of Christ. Paul writes, "I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow. The one who plants and the one who waters have one purpose, and they will each be rewarded according to their own labor. For we are co-workers in God's service; you are God's field, God's building" (1 Corinthians 3:6-9 NIV11).

We are at a very unique point in our ministry, much like the Corinthian church was. We have so many new faces to learn and get used to. These new faces can be used by Satan to turn the Church against itself, just like he did in the Corinthian church. But, these new faces are united in carrying out the "one purpose" Paul talks about.

## From Our New Principal By Mr. John Melso

Frequently I am asked how many students are enrolled this year at St. Paul's, so here it is - 108,000. You read that right - 108,000 students. Seems like a lot? Actually it might be significantly low. Let me explain. In Scripture God says, "*Know therefore that the LORD your God is God; he is the faithful God, keeping his covenant of love to a thousand generations of those who love him and keep his commandments.*" (Deuteronomy 7:9, also in Exodus 20:6 and Deut. 5:10) As we teach a child the saving message in God's Word, we are not only teaching that child but also that child's children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren and ... The impact of the Christian education taught at St. Paul's Lutheran School is beyond the ability to count. All the effort and cost to provide Christian education is worth it. It reaps eternal benefits to thousands. To God be the glory!!!

The 2018-2019 school year will surely be a year of change. There will be many new faces. Pastor Proeber was recently ordained and installed, four new teachers will be installed soon, and several new families are enrolled at St. Paul's. As of right now, we have 108 seats that will be filled with preschoolers through 8<sup>th</sup> graders. At the installation service at 9AM on Sunday, July 29, you will have the opportunity to greet our new principal and teachers if you have not met them already. They are already at work preparing for the new school year. In fact, the first faculty meeting has already taken place. It was determined that Mr. Melso will teach grade 1,2, and 3 math. This will provide additional time for Mrs. Obsuszt and Mrs. Fiecko to teach reading and language arts. We want to make sure that all third graders are good readers. Students learn to read in kindergarten, first, and second grade. They read to learn starting in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade. It is our goal that students be proficient readers by 3<sup>rd</sup> grade. Pastor Proeber will teach 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade catechism and Mr. Quint will teach 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade catechism as well as Christ Light. More information about those changes will be shared with school families as we get closer to the start of school.

Over the course of the school year there will be many and varied opportunities for St. Paul's members to get involved in school activities. We want everyone to have the opportunity to be a part of our ministry to families. Keep a look out for volunteer requests when they are published or when you receive a tap on the shoulder. In fact, you can get started right away by including the faculty, families, and school leaders in your prayers as they work diligently to share the message of salvation to all who pass through our doors.

## What is SWEPS?

SWEPS, the South Wood Emerging Pantry Shelf, located at 331 12th Avenue South in the former Reynolds Hardware store location, exists "to identify those in South Wood County who experience food insecurity, provide them food and everyday essentials in an atmosphere that promotes dignity and respect, and to foster community engagement and cooperation in the everyday struggle against hunger" as stated in their mission statement.

As part of this community engagement, St. Paul's serves about four times each year for a week at a time. Hours are Noon to 4 pm on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, and 4 to 7 pm on Tuesday. On each of these days, 4-5 people "shop" for clients who have been preapproved for services. Volunteers shop from a predetermined list that varies according to family size, available foods, and client preferences. Sometimes additional tasks, such as packing bulk foods, sorting, shelving, etc., are done when time allows.

SWEPS is also a Feeding America Eastern Wisconsin member agency. To help keep the shelves stocked, Feeding America linked SWEPS with local retailers through its "Direct Connect" program which enables them to collect food directly from local stores. Food donations are also accepted from individuals, organizations, and food drives, such as the USPS food collections.

In 2017, SWEPS served an average of 504 households per month. (A household is limited to just one visit per month). This equates to an average of 1288 people served each month. Daily about 25 orders are filled. More and more households are seen each month.

This is one of the ways that St. Paul's Willing Workers help to serve our community. However, volunteers are not limited to just members of the Willing Workers! Included in each of the orders filled is a card that lists our church location, time of services, special invitations to events such as Advent, Lent, VBS, etc., and a Bible verse as a means of outreach to the community at large.

SWEPS is staffed largely by volunteers. If you are interested in becoming involved in this vital ministry, please contact Judy Anderson at 715-423-5922 or 5JAnderson@charter.net. Our next week of service is August 6-10.

Across the country, substance abuse, pornography addiction and struggles with mental health issues are soaring. Currently, WELS churches lack sufficient programming and resources to address these needs with solidly Lutheran spiritual resources. Lutheran Recovery Ministries has responded with RESILIENT Recovery groups and now a recovery retreat for WELS members. The goals for the retreat are to provide a positive spiritual experience for WELS members who are: (a) in recovery from a substance abuse disorder, pornography addiction or a mental health disorder; (b) have a loved-one in recovery; or (c) struggle with any habitual sin; AND equip attendees to develop and improve recovery ministries in their home churches.

The Lutheran Recovery Ministries' Recovery Retreat will be in Phoenix, AZ on October 26 -28. The theme is Finding Hope Amidst Pain and Suffering. There will be sharing meetings (both mixed and according to need), breakout groups, Law and Gospel presentation, guided prayers, songs, a Sunday service, socializing and lots to eat! The organizers are keeping it somewhat intimate with 50-60 attendees.
