While the rest of the world is waiting for the first of January to celebrate the beginning of another New Year, we are already entering another New Church Year. Instead of going through the year naming familiar months such as January, February, and March, you will find events and activities such as Advent, Epiphany and Lent. What is the thought behind two kinds of calendars?

You will notice that the first Sunday of December this year is the first Sunday of Advent. Advent marks the beginning of the New Church Year. Why the need for two beginnings; isn't one enough? Understand the purpose. The Church Calendar was set up to make sure that every year the church would focus on the most important truths of the Bible.

The Church Year begins with a time of preparation for the celebration of Christ's birth, which is called Advent. It focuses on the birth of Jesus at Christmas. It then continues with Epiphany as Gentiles worship Jesus, and then Lent readies us to see the brutality that Jesus endured to earn our salvation. There is also Jesus' resurrection as Easter is celebrated. We see his Ascension as he goes to heaven and promises to return. Then God gives the Holy Spirit to the church on the Day of Pentecost. All this emphasizes the life of Christ and the cost of our salvation.

As one approaches the second half of the year, the Sundays after Pentecost go from the life of Christ to the Christian's life. It focuses on our response to everything Jesus did to save us. It stresses growth in our Christian faith and ends with the goal of our faith, which is the salvation of our souls. Those last days of the Church Year turn our eyes to Jesus' return and our readiness for the great and final day.

From start to finish, the year centers on Jesus. Isn't this true, that no matter if it is the New Year or the New Church Year, the focus of our year should be Jesus. So celebrate this New Church Year, and have a happy New Year!

Advent Blues

The blue we use in our paraments and other decorations for Advent represents hope and expectation. Deep blue is the color of the sky in the cold, dark hours before sunrise. And so, the blue of Advent reminds us of our hopeful anticipation of the dawn of Christ, when he will turn all darkness into light.

Our midweek Advent services will take their cue from the Advent color blue. Although Christ's birth was foretold in scripture, it seemed to come "out of the blue" for most people. His family was of "royal blue blood," tracing its lineage back to King David. And Jesus' birth was preceded by that of a "true blue baby," John the Baptist, who would faithfully prepare God's people for the work of the Messiah.

Join us on Wednesdays during Advent at either 3:30 or 6:30 p.m. It is an extra chance for you to focus on the real reason for the holiday season, our Savior Jesus Christ.

Christmas Caroling


Sunday, Dec. 10 at 12:30 p.m. meet at church
