Pray for Patience By Pastor Baur

A dear friend of mine once made this statement. "I never pray for patience." This surprising statement came from the mouth of a faithful and well-seasoned Christian lady. My curiosity led me to ask what led her to that conclusion. She said, "I never pray for patience because I am afraid what the Lord will send to teach me." Do you notice something about patience in that line? It is not idly waiting for something to happen. It is not just killing time. Patience is not passive. Instead, it is how we actively deal with the circumstances as we wait for a certain outcome. It is the perseverance to stick with it even when the outcome is not in sight.

That means that patience is taught as we experience the tougher occasions in life. It is enduring through whatever comes our way with an attitude that doesn't complain, but trusts that God is still in charge. Case in point. You may say that for the past year we have been waiting for another pastor to

accept the call to serve in our midst. We say that calls for patience. Much patience, because a year is an awfully long time. After all, how much patience would be needed if a new pastor arrived in a week or two? And so, we pray for patience and the Lord answers that prayer by teaching us in ways we would have never imagined or asked for. (Which one of us would ask for



a vacancy that lasted over a year?) While we are patiently waiting, God is patiently teaching us.

He is teaching patience as we give up our timeline as to when the call will be answered and trust his time. He is teaching patience as we struggle to understand why the obvious person we chose is the one he didn't chose. He is teaching patience as we recognize that he is still in control and we are not.

Do you still want to pray for patience as we wait for another pastor, or are we afraid of what the Lord will send to teach us? Once again, patience is not idly waiting for something to happen. It is not just killing time. Instead, it is how we actively deal with the circumstances as we wait for a certain outcome. It is the perseverance to stick with it even when the outcome is not in sight. So pray for patience, and see how the Lord will answer our prayer. Fixing Up the Parsonage

Work on the parsonage is moving right along. It is exciting to see the transformation that our new pastor will be able to enjoy. There are things happening all the way from the basement to the main bathroom. The basement bathroom is nearly complete. The previously water damaged walls have been replaced and it has been textured and painted. The new vanity is in place and waiting for the arrival of the faucet. A new circuit breaker box has been installed to allow for expansion and all circuits tracked down for labeling. Some new valves and an air separator are going on the boiler.

Upstairs the majority of the demolition is complete. We ran into some problems in the laundry room bathroom, where a slow leak at the base of the toilet rotted out the floor over the years. This has been repaired and is ready for the next steps towards completion.

Several women of the congregation helped figure out a layout that would make the kitchen area more family friendly and inviting. The new layout will be more open and the entire area will flow together, including the play area next to the kitchen. The kitchen is completely bare. All the cabinets are removed and the soffits have been removed to make room for the taller cabinets. Some of the cabinets are here but not ready to install yet. Work on the install will begin soon. There are new recessed lights that will be installed as well.

A big job coming up is the flooring. There is a lot of it, and it will be on-site in the next couple days. If you have experience with glue-down vinyl plank flooring, please contact me.

This is a great reminder as we hit summer vacation to keep our focus on our Treasure and to keep Him as part of our weekly worship life and daily devotional life. We start the summer months with an enrollment for the 2017-2018 school year at 114 students (3K-8th). This is the highest enrollment St. Paul's has had since 2006-2007. We praise God for the blessings of new students and families He continues to shower down on our school. Please continue to pray for the school during the summer as we prepare for the next school year. We will open the new school year on Monday, August 28th, with our opening service.

We have a couple of projects to work on during the summer months. First, we will be putting up a fence around the Little Lamb's playground. Last summer we removed some of the parking lot and planted grass to increase the size of the playground. The other project we will be tackling is updating the wire-less capabilities at St. Paul's. We will be installing two new access points, which will improve the connectivity of our wireless signal.

Finally, as many of you know, Mrs. Obsuszt will continue working on her synod certification. She is currently enrolled in two classes at Martin Luther College (MLC). Also, in January, I started a master's program through MLC. I will be working towards a master's degree in administration. I completed my first course this spring on curriculum development. I will start putting what I learned in the class into action this summer and in the upcoming school year as we begin work on our Social Studies curriculum. This summer I am taking a class on school leadership. In all, I will have to complete 30 classroom credits and a six-credit project to graduate. I have seven years to complete the program.
