Wrestle with God

I find myself asking the questions, "God, why are you not listening? Why are you not hearing my prayer and giving me an answer?" I believe God is teaching me, and frankly all of us at St. Paul's, a lesson in the power of persistent prayer. Sometimes we have to keep on praying and understand that God's timing may not be the same as ours and He may not give us the answer we are looking for. However, He does promise to hear us when we pray.

As I was considering the power of persistent prayer, my first thoughts were drawn to the story of Jacob wrestling with God. Jacob would not let go until the "man" he was wrestling with blessed him. Genesis 32:22-32 (ESV):

the Lord hears our persistent prayers

The same night he arose and took his two wives, his two female servants, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and everything else he had. And Jacob was left alone. And a man wrestled with him until the breaking of the day. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he touched his hip socket, and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, "Let me go, for the day has broken." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go unless you bless me." And he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." Then he said, "Your name shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with men, and have prevailed." Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. So Jacob called the name of the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life has been delivered."

This happened at a time where Jacob was really afraid. He was going back to see his brother Esau. He had cheated Esau of his birthright and blessing. He feared for his life. What did Jacob do?

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He prayed fervently and humbly asking God to deliver him from his brother. Later, what you just read above happened. Jacob wrestled with God! Maybe God is providing us the opportunity to wrestle with Him. We should pray persistently and pray boldly knowing that God hears our prayers and promises to bless us and His Church.

The parable of the persistent widow is another example of the power of persistent prayer. In Luke 18:1-8, Jesus tells us a story of a widow who wanted justice. Over and over again, she would go back to the judge and he would give the same refusal to her request. But, he finally did grant her justice because she kept going back to him persistently.

And he told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected man. And there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him saying, 'Give me justice against my adversary.' For a while he refused, but afterward he said to himself, "Though I neither fear God nor respect man, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will give her justice, so that she will not beat me down by her continual coming." And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge says. And will not God give justice to his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will give justice to them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth? (ESV)

What a great lesson from Jesus on the power of persistent prayer. Jesus himself promises that the Lord hears our persistent prayers and grants them. Let us faithfully continue to pray – not only that God would send called workers to our church, but also for those who are already serving among us. God hears our prayers and answers when the time is right and according to His own perfect plan for us. Wrestle with God in faithful prayer and He will bless us.


