More Changes Ahead

It is safe to say St. Paul's teaching staff will look a little different next year. Mr. Engelbrecht and Mrs. Mueller accepted their calls, and Mrs. Engelbrecht resigned her call to be eligible to teach somewhere closer to Mr. Engelbrecht in the Onalaska area. This certainly is a lot of change.

This is not the only possible change to the teaching staff for the 2018-2019 school year. Over the last few months, St. Paul's school board has been working with the teaching staff to best understand the needs of the school. After many discussions, the school board proposed calling a full-time 3rd/4th grade teacher. This proposal would do a couple of things. First, it would return the teaching staff to the same staffing levels we had when Mr. and Mrs. Engelbrecht accepted their calls to teach at St. Paul's 12 years ago. Our projected enrollment for the 2018-19 school year is between 117-120 3K-8th grade. While this would put a full-time teacher into the 3rd and 4th grade classroom, it would provide the opportunity to move the principal position back to a half-administrator, half-teacher. The principal would then essentially act as a float teacher among the different classrooms picking up classes to help eliminate full classrooms for core subject areas. Plus, it would give the new principal the time needed to do his administrative duties.

We are very excited at the support this proposal has received by the members of St. Paul's members. We encourage you to add this proposal to your prayer list in the next few months along with the calls which will be extended for a new principal, childcare director/ preschool teacher, and kindergarten teacher. To some this may seem like a daunting process, but be reminded who truly is in control, God. There are no challenges God cannot solve.
