## A Restoration Project By Pastor Lucas Proeber

I'm not much of a mechanic. I have a brother-in-law who knows everything there is to know about cars, so I've picked up some car knowledge here and there just from talking to him or seeing his posts on social media. One of his favorite things to do is find old parts or an old chassis to bring back to life. He refurbishes




and renews parts that may have been sitting in a barn for years with no maintenance whatsoever. When he's finished with them, they not only work; they work and look and run better than they ever did before.

But something else I've learned about that kind of work: it doesn't happen overnight. In fact, it takes an enormous amount of time and patience. My brother-in-law knows that, but that doesn't make the process go any more smoothly or quickly. There are certainly bumps in the road. I'm sure there have been days when he would've rather not started the project or when he would rather give up and move on to something easier and more rewarding.

Do you sense that same thing can be said about our congregation? You could say that, for a period of about two years, due to circumstances that no one (other than God) could have foreseen, St. Paul's was like a car that had no maintenance, no checkups, no repairs. Anyone who has worked closely with cars knows that a couple years of no maintenance spells trouble for a car. Metals rust, fluids need changing, dents occur, parts just stop working—and they all affect how efficiently the car runs.

Apply that to the church: there are dents in people's hearts, perhaps from a bad experience or a soured relationship; some aspects of ministry were left sitting idle, simply because people didn't know how to continue that aspect without pastoral guidance; some people entirely withdrew from church and stopped giving of themselves because they didn't see a point in being part of a congregation that didn't have a "mechanic" to conduct "regular maintenance." continued on pg 2 God's House. (I'm using broad generalities. I realize there were ministries that continued and became quite strong through this time. Thank God for his continued work through you!)

I'm not God; I can't promise instant miracles like turning water into wine or raising the dead to life or making a large mortgage disappear with a flick of the wrist. But perhaps God has brought me here to be a spiritual mechanic—to use the tool of the Word of God to smooth out those dents, to get those parts that were more idle running again, to find the pieces that fell off the chassis entirely, to strengthen the parts that still work the way they always have.

This is a big vehicle we're a part of here at St. Paul's. There's no way, barring a miracle, that we can get up and running to full speed as quickly as we would like. It takes time and patience to refresh ministries; to call back the lost and disengaged; to heal from past hurts, whatever they might be. It also takes wisdom and selflessness to acknowledge and determine what is going to glorify God the most in our unique circumstances. To put that another way, not every car uses exactly the same parts to function properly—especially when you're restoring an old car, you will probably have to decide what works best for what you want the car to do. We must look at why we are here and what we can do to best serve that purpose.

While we continue to move forward, continue to pray. Pray for patience when you don't see immediate changes or results from things that are being done. Pray for me, that I might be a faithful "mechanic." Pray for wisdom in how you can use your gifts and abilities to help all our ministries get back to full speed.

Finally, no matter what we do, God has our course all lined out for us. Pray for God to bless our efforts and to show us how best to serve each other and those in our community with his gospel message. Because without his gracious blessing and gospel message, nothing else we do matters one bit.

## Lent Begins March 6

Join us for midweek Lenten services on Wednesdays, from March 6 through April 10. This will give you an extra opportunity to focus on Jesus and his sacrifice for our sins. The theme is "Three Words of Truth" with each service focusing on a three-word phrase from Jesus' passion and resurrection. There is a service at 3:35 p.m. and another at 6:30 p.m. with supper serviced in between.

To spread out the work involved in our fellowship suppers, we ask that all members pitch in to help. We've divide the congregation into three teams with each team serving twice during Lent. We used vinegar and baking soda to make a balloon inflate over a plastic bottle. Then we wrote about what happened. Our hypothesis was accurate. There was chemical reaction that took place.

We have decided against pursuing an Easter for Kids this year with the close timing to the Children's Festival. We will plan an Easter for Kids in 2020. Our goal is to have a plan of events spaced throughout the year that allows us to invite prospects to successive events. With this goal in mind, we decided to create a new outreach event called Summer Splash Party for the month of June. The repeating Trunk-or-Treat event was also merged into our calendar.

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
