New Faces... In the pulpit



God's timing is perfect. Just as Pastor Baur is retiring, the Lord has provided another pastor to help us through our vacancy. Pastor Dennis J. Valleau is retiring to the Rome area this spring. He has expressed a willingness to lead our worship service two Sundays a month and serve in other ways one day a week. Many of you met Pastor Valleau when he first preached for us on April 8.

Pastor Valleau provided the following summary of his life: He was born in Milwaukee in 1950, where he was baptized. Later in life he was confirmed at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in West Allis.

Pastor Valleau married his dear wife Claudia in 1974, and together they served St. John's Lutheran Church in Baraboo during his vicar year. After graduation from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in 1976 they moved to Allentown, PA, where he served Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Allentown and Ascension Lutheran Church in Harrisburg, PA.

In 1978 he began to serve St. John's Lutheran Church in Allegan, MI. During some of the time there, he also served Christ Lutheran Church in Holland, MI, and served as Circuit Pastor as well as in several conference and synodical positions.

In 1988 he began to serve St. John's Lutheran Church in Lake City, MN, where he served until 2015 when he accepted the call to serve Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Wabasha, MN, and Grace Lutheran Church in Nelson, WI. While serving at Lake City he also served as the first Circuit Pastor for the new Eagleview Circuit.

Pastor and Claudia have three children: Charles (Chelsea) Valleau (children Trinity, Wyatt, and Evelyn), Michael (Rebecca) Valleau (children Bethany, Kendra, Evan, and Naomi), and Amanda (Dan) Kreuter. All live in the Twin Cities area.



What an April! These kiddos are keeping me on my toes. We started the month with a field trip at Northland Lutheran High School learning about seeds. We had a biology lesson that tied to a Bible lesson about planting the seed of faith on four different types of ground. We also planted seeds which will grow in the community garden.

We moved on to preparing for our play. This year we performed "The Tale of the Gingerbread Man" for an adoring crowd. Pleasantly, this class enjoyed being in the spotlight and even hammed it up a bit, which I prefer over having a terrified cast of actors.

Next we celebrated the Week of the Young child. A local artist came and guided parent and child to create a canvass painting together. The process helps us have a meaningful experience while creating artwork to hang that reminds us of this time together.

All during the month I as teacher had to keep digging into my wide toolbox of teaching materials. These kiddos are so motivated that I am digging out first grade lessons for them in both reading and math. They have a bit of a competitive nature too at this age. We are constantly setting goals and breaking them. For example: the record for reading 30 sight words right now is 13 seconds; our record in gym is catching 37 bounce passes; in math we are at math fact level 46 from the first grade curriculum, but a previous class made it to level 50 so we NEED to beat that level too; we even set the record for the most teeth lost in one year. Last year we lost 31 teeth, this year we are already up to 32! (to name a few goals we are keeping track of)

The good news with all of these goals, is that we know we are a team. We work together to make each other better. We have teammates and partners almost all day long. And this is just April! Stay tuned for our accomplishments in May.


