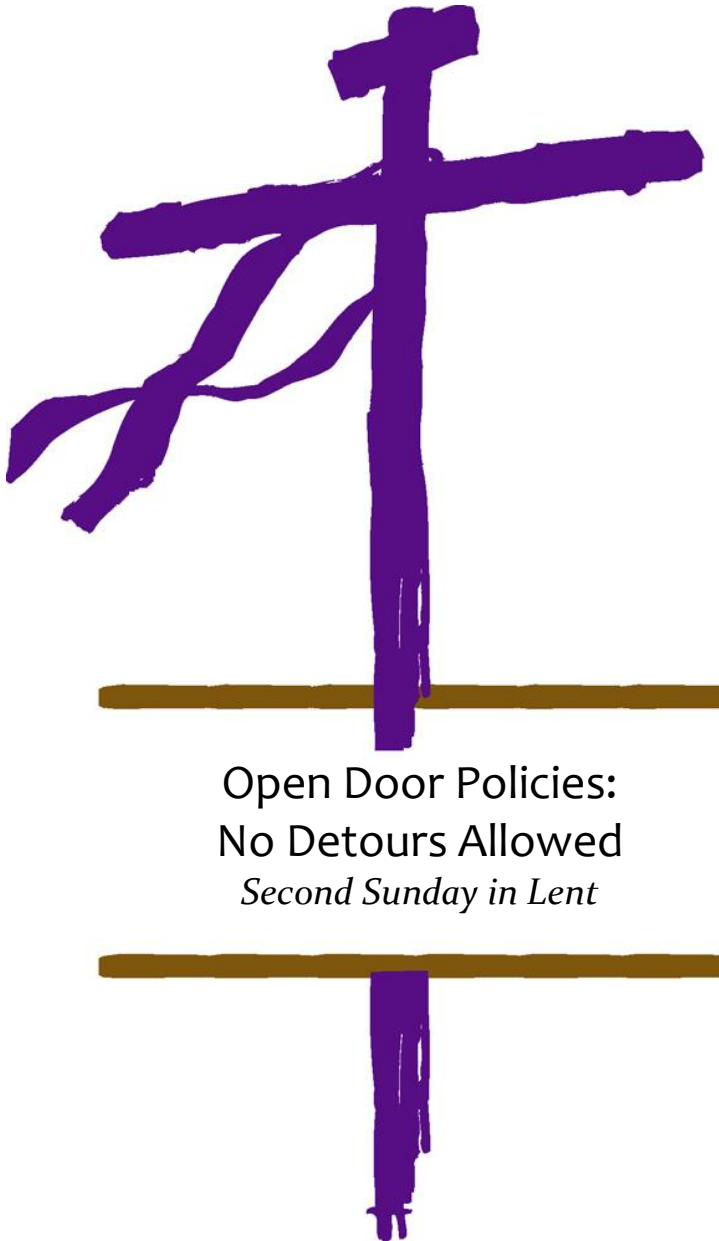

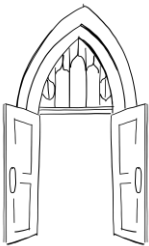


Welcome To Worship

Jeremiah 26:8–15

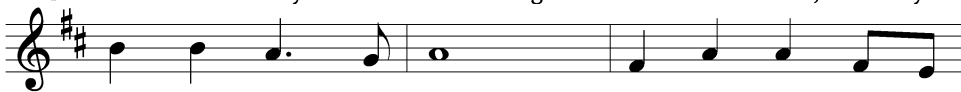

Philippians 3:17—4:1

Paul explains that being a follower of Jesus means that our path in life will resemble his. Paul encourages us to not try and take detours as we journey toward heaven.

¹⁷ Brothers, join together in imitating me and in paying attention to those who are walking according to the pattern we gave you. ¹⁸ To be sure, many walk as enemies of the cross of Christ. 

3. What similarities exist between this reading and events at the end of Jesus' life?

4. Paul encourages us to model ourselves after those who live according to the pattern he gave us. Identify a current or past Christian role model in your life. In what ways did God bless you through them?
5. Compare and contrast what Paul says about the "enemies of the cross of Christ" and us fellow believers.
6. Paul urges us to stand firm in the hope we have. How can we best prepare ourselves to run the race to eternal life?

Luke 13:31-35

7. Choose one adjective to characterize Jesus' response to this warning from the Pharisees. What does that tell you about his attitude toward persecution?
8. Where was Jesus' focus and ultimate goal (v. 33b)? For what reasons is that so surprising? For what reasons is that so comforting for us?
9. Describe the heart of Jesus for the Jewish people as we see it in vv. 34 and 35.
